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Rimma M. Baikieva is Associate Professor of the Department of Piano at the Ufa State Academy of Arts. She is the member of Laboratory of Musical Semantics. She has finished the graduate school of the State Musical-Pedagogic Institute named after Gnesins in Moscow. The circle of her scholarly interest covers the questions of musical semantics, psychology, theory of piano performance and pedagogy, and children's piano repertoire. The topic of her dissertation is «Hero as a Category of Musical Poetics in the Pieces of the Children's Piano Repertoire.» On this topic Ms. Baikieva has published a number of articles in Russian language.

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Luiz E. Castelões is Brazilian contemporary-music composer and scholar (DMA, Boston University; MM, BM, Universidade do Rio de Janeiro). Research interests include: musical onomatopoeia, Brazilian popular music, and sonology.

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Marina G. Her field of research interest includes Russian vocal culture of the first half of XIX century. Russian original system is based on five ranks, in ascending order: mladshij prepodavatel (roughly, equivalent of an instructor), prepodavatel (assistant professor), starshij prepodavatel (associate professor), docent (this one is absent in the US, but can be compared with a non-tenured senior faculty member), and professor (tenured professor) (I. Kh).

² The Russian system of scholarly degrees is different from Master's — Doctoral degrees format. It is especially evident in the field of music since the Russian pedagogical system offers a stage of early professional musical education (7-year children's school and 4-year utchilische) that does not exist in the West. Keeping this in mind, one may evaluate the Dipom of the conservatory as an equivalent of Master's Degree, the Candidate of Arts as the equivalent of Ph. D. or DMA and the Doctor of Arts as a special degree that is given to a prominent figure in the field after minimum of 10 years of successful teaching and research career (I. Kh.).
